Rotary Curling Tour to Canada 2012

Every four years a team of 22 Rotarians leave Scotland for a months curling tour of Canada, and every 4 years a Canadian Rotary curling team comes to Scotland. The first tour from Canada was in 1957 and it has been going every fours years since then.

I was fortunate enough to be chosen to take part in the Canadian tour of 2012, and though I had been on a Royal Caledonian Curling Club tour to the USA in 2007, I was apprehensive of



the fact that 95% of the time we were being hosted by our Rotary Hosts. My main reason was "time to

ourselves " as we had enjoyed on the USA tour as we stayed in hotels.

It all started in August 2011 when the team was selected, and we had our first meeting

when we would all meet each other for the first time in some cases. Jobs were



allocated and I was chosen to arrange the formal and informal clothes, needless to say, this was quickly handed over to Julie, who did an excellent job in kitting out the team in their "finery". Each person had a set of formal wear, a set of casual wear plus curling kit. The teams were allocated and I was fortunate to join a team whose skip was Matt Murdoch, who is the father of David Murdoch, World and known each other for a number of years, so I knew it would be an enjoyable, but tough tour.

Money was collected and a Sergeant at Arms was appointed, this was the only lady in the team, and her job was to fine any person for any misdemeanour. All moneys raised in this way went to a Canadian Charity of our choosing.

We arrived in Montreal on Sunday 28th October about two hours late, and were meet by 21 of the 22 Canadian curlers from the previous tour. What a welcome. We were then whisked off to our hotel, got changed and met down in the Bar, (Where else)!

The following day we had our first curling

match; with most of the Scottish team looking a wee bit the worst for wear. After



the match we were introduced to our hosts for the first two nights. This pattern was repeated throughout the tour, and, it worked exceedingly well. As we were with our hosts for two nights, one day would be set aside for sightseeing, and one day for curling, with formal or informal dinners, depending on where we were.

The hosts came from very different walks of life, and I stayed with one family whose home was very cosy, but very small, and in one house, where my home could have fitted into their "lobby" with room to spare. In all cases they

were all excellent hosts, and could not do enough for us. I was fortunate to stay with some families who were very involved with the local youth. Other families took us out to see where the old colonial forts were, and one member of our team was shown the prisoner of war camp where his Italian father had spent the war years.

Some of the group hosting was quite amazing, as the Canadian houses all had cellars and some of these had been turned in "play rooms" with their own pool and bar.

Throughout the tour, we were not allowed to pay for anything and we hardly put our hands into our pockets. One of my hosts, had contact with an Amish family and I was able to meet the head of the house, which was most interesting, and to hear how they lived. He had installed electricity in his work shed to help him make hen houses and the like, but had not told his father who lived at another farm, as this is forbidden.

The whole tour was in Ontario, and we were able to visit Niagara Falls and the Canadian Parliament where were we entertained to lunch and meet up with the Canadian Foreign Minister.

One of my most enjoyable occasions was an evening when we were split into groups, and taken around to 6 different houses, each group staring in a different house with a starter before moving on to another house were they had soup, and so on. It needed good timing and worked exceeding well. One of my host's lady friends is a blind golfer and blind curler, and I have recently heard that she has just won the world blind golfing championship in Australia and is now competing in the world blind curling championship.

Golf and curling in Canada, in some places go hand in hand, with the club having both a golf course and a curling rink; this meant that the clubhouse was used throughout the year. An excellent idea, with great facilities, but oh! the

cost to be a member!

Though we were away for a month, on reflection,



it just flew past and my apprehension was totally wrong, as on my arrival at the hosts house, I was offered alternative things to do, and asked if any laundry needed washing. In the vast majority of cases, we all had our own bathroom facilities, and though most of the Canadian households had "hot tubs" very few of the people used them.

We flew back with all three trophies that were being played for, a very tired, but happy group with great memories of a month spent with some wonderful people, seeing interesting places and some great curling also having made some new friends.

This year in November a Canadian Rotary team is coming over and I am starting to look for hosts, who would be willing to have a fellow Rotarian in their home. It is a great way for forging Rotary Fellowship and of having a friend across the "pond"
